

Three weeks ago, at 3:00 AM, we all woke up in panic to a new reality — a war between Israel and Iran.

In an instant, we transitioned from normal routine —to a state of full emergency. (Not exactly "routine" or "Normal". We are all living the nightmare of the Gaza war and dozens of hostages languishing in tunnels) — Everything shut down immediately, except for essential services, and we encountered shelters and fortified rooms several times each day.

Now, that we are in the midst of the ceasefire, (that we all hope will last and lead to a long-term agreement), it is time to thank everyone who helped us get through this difficult period:

- The service branches in the community, which never stopped working to provide us with the critical services.
- The education, health, and cultural clusters, which continued their noble work, adapting to the new conditions.

- Workers in the production branches and outside workers, who continued to work throughout the period, some without proper protection and some traveling extensively across the country.
- The many volunteers adults, young people, and teenagers who helped families, distributed mattresses, volunteered in the laundry, and responded to every request and call.
- The emergency team (Tzachi), which gathered for the first time at 4:00 am (On the first day of the war), and from then, for 12 days, took full control.
- The one and only **Lilach Ron**, who, alongside her full-time job, manages the emergency team with strength, calm, and confidence. We all feel more at ease and more secure thanks to you.

And to all of you — the entire Yizrael community — we appreciate the calm and responsible civil behaviour and the adherence to guidelines that allowed us to pass this period safely.

May we know quiet days and hear good news, and may all the hostages return home quickly.

Updates from the Absorption Committee

1. Absorption of Evacuee Families

In accordance with the Assembly's decision to absorb up to 4 evacuated families, we are pleased to update:

• In mid-July 2025, the Sherer family from Kibbutz Mefalsim will arrive: Yaniv, originally from Kibbutz Ga'ash, works in the "Five Fingers" movement as a customer service manager and is expected to become a trainer in the Emek Yizrael area.

Diana, who immigrated to Israel through the NA'ALE program from Uruguay to Kibbutz Mefalsim. Diana is a "forest nursery school teacher" in the Ministry of Education's kindergartens and is currently seeking work in the Yizrael area. (There are plenty of forests in the area – Ed) * (See explanation at the end of this update - Ed)

The Sherer children:

Alma, finishing 4th grade and will join the "Tiltan" group.

Yam, finishing 2nd grade and will join the Mango group.

Amit, completing kindergarten and will move up to first grade.

The family has already visited the school and the kibbutz with the children in May, and also attended the Shavuot ceremony in Yizrael. They will reside in Lower Tzameret housing, above the Darom family.

The accompanying family: Sanker family.

Liaison on behalf of the Absorption Committee: Keren Kagan.

 During the summer, another evacuee family from the Gaza envelope was supposed to arrive for absorption.

This family has already successfully completed all assessment stages. However, at the last minute, they decided to seize an opportunity and move abroad for a relocation. The family wishes to thank the Yizrael community for their willingness to have them and for opening their hearts and homes.

• End of the absorption process for evacuee families:
In fact, this summer we are completing the absorption process for evacuee families. (Meir from the North and Sherer from the South).

2. Pre-Absorption

In accordance with the Assembly's decision regarding the demographic plan, the Absorption Committee is advancing its implementation.

Preparations for Summer 2026 absorption:
 We are currently nearing the completion of screening and assessments for families arriving in summer 2026, aiming to accept about six suitable families.
 The screening includes personality assessments, financial evaluations,

personal interviews by a kibbutz team, medical information sharing, home visits and more.

Preparations for Summer 2027 absorption:

We are now in the initial stages of screening families for arrival in summer 2027. For about half a year, we have been conducting Zoom meetings with interested parties. During these sessions, we detail kibbutz life and its implications, and answer many questions.

Once the initial registration phase is complete, we will host the shortlisted candidates in the kibbutz for in-person meetings ahead of the next steps. The hosting event will take place on Friday morning, 11.7.25.

We want to emphasize that the Absorption Committee is doing its best to ensure the arrival of the most suitable candidates, reflecting the available options and preparing them thoroughly for their arrival.

Absorption of kibbutz children:

The committee is continuously in contact with kibbutz children regarding absorption in cooperation with the Young Generation Committee.

Currently, ten families and individuals are in the absorption process on the kibbutz. Some are already in their final year, while others are just beginning to get to know the kibbutz.

In total, there are 32 people: 18 adults and 14 children.

The new families are starting to integrate into kibbutz life. They are joining holiday teams and various committees as observers. This helps them get to know our way of life more closely.

Each absorbed individual or family receives a host family from the kibbutz. The host family helps them settle in, explains our traditions, and is simply there when needed.

We would like to thank everyone who is assisting in the absorption process, especially the committee members who work with the new families and ensure everything proceeds smoothly.




Absorption Committee

Delving into the Archives

The Sheep Branch

Fifty years ago, we closed the sheep Branch. The branch was established when the kibbutz was still in the village (Zarin). Throughout most of its existence, Eilon HaLevi managed the sheep, and many members worked there for varying periods—Myself among them (Eddie Solow took over from Eilon and closed the branch with my brother, Barry – Jules). And we must not forget Salah Hai, who worked there from the beginning until its closure. (Salach lived in the "Ma'abera" (Absorbtion centre) and then moved to Afula. He worked on Yizrael until he retired - Ed)



Two problems persisted throughout the years: frequent thefts and dogs. When a dog entered and barked, the sheep would panic, run, and crowd in a corner, where they would suffocate to death. In the morning, we would find a heap of carcasses. We informed the public: "This is our livelihood, and any dog that approaches will be eliminated."

Indeed, there was an incident where a dog entered and was shot. This did not go

unnoticed. The owner went to the secretary to complain. The secretary, Amen Becker, said he would handle it. He called the person who shot the dog in "for a discussion", and asked him, "Did you shoot the dog on the side of the pen close to the kibbutz or on the far side?" Upon hearing the answer: "On the close side," Amen responded, "Then next time, shoot on the far side!" (There is a

Jonathan Henry Sacks, Baron Sacks (8 March 1948 - 7 November 2020) was an English Orthodox rabbi, philosopher, theologian, and author. Sacks served as the Chief Rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregations of the Commonwealth from 1991 to 2013. As the spiritual head of the United Synagogue, the largest synagogue body in the United Kingdom, he was the Chief Rabbi of those Orthodox synagogues but was not recognized as the religious authority for the Haredi Union of Orthodox Hebrew Congregations or for the progressive movements such as Conservative, Reform, and Liberal Judaism. [2][3] As Chief Rabbi, he formally carried the title of Av Beit Din (head) of the London Beth Din. At the time of his death, he was the Chief Rabbi Emeritus.[4]
