Excerpts from Nadav Eyal's Speech to the Nir Oz Community in Kiryat Gat:

"I come to you today as a journalist. Journalists do not speak at rallies or demonstrations. Their job is to report. But when Nir Oz asks, one must come. And I came to deliver a personal message This report is owed to you, paid for in blood. There is no place where Zionism was realized like Nir Oz, and no place where Zionism failed like Nir Oz. October 7th was the peak of the failure, but it began long before that... The failure was in the policies of Netanyahu's governments over the generations, which saw Hamas as a strategic asset to thwart the Palestinian state... I came to report to you that there is a chance for a deal. And tonight, the door is wider open than any other night for many months... No less important, the deal is the result of a few people in the defense establishment who did not give up and were not willing, come what may, to let the possibility of returning the hostages be missed. I came to report to you what I have already written and reported: The most senior officials involved in the negotiations are convinced that the Prime Minister and his people, in cooperation with the extreme right, tried to thwart a deal, for political reasons. The senior officials do not say this in the open, so that they can continue to influence from within, so that they can bring back the Israelis who are now in the heart of a living hell. But do not be mistaken, they do say this and dangerous, toxic fuel has long since permeated the holy mission of returning our hostages. These are days of tragedy. In my opinion, the greatest tragedy is not the surprise of October 7th in the initial attack. A tragedy, no less significant, is what happened in the first hours when you cried out to us from the

shelters and the forces did not manage to arrive. But the greatest tragedy is the hostility, the animosity, and sometimes the violence against the families of the hostages. The product of an endless machine of poison and incitement, of such intense political hatred that it managed to neutralize the most basic empathy for people who just want to see their father, their child, their grandfather, at home. The families of the hostages are going through this living hell, not only the endless anxiety for their loved ones but also the feeling that some of their fellow citizens, with the support or encouragement and silence of the current political leadership, have turned against them. The families have become "the enemies of the people". And the truth is that the families of the hostages have become scapegoats. They are a constant reminder of the sin that the State of Israel has committed against its citizens. They have become the lightning rods of the extreme nationalism. I want to report to you the facts: In the face of incitement, we must remember that a large majority in Israel believes that returning the hostages is currently more important than any other goal. This majority is growing, not shrinking as the war continues, ... Therefore, under no circumstances should we give up or remain silent for one moment. Much is said about the price of a painful deal and the release of terrorists, and cessation of the war. We must talk about the incomprehensible, incalculable price if the hostages, those who are still alive, are not brought home because the deal somehow evaporates or explodes. And I tell you more than that, senior security officials say that even if there were no hostages, even then, the Israeli interest is to go now for a ceasefire deal... You are Nir Oz, the place where there was no state. where the terrorists annihilated all life. As if we did not establish anything here – no army, no police, no sovereignty. You cannot be preached to anymore. The entire government should have stood before this community, on its knees, and asked for forgiveness... If the hostages do not return, if we give up on them, not only will we not be able to look into your eyes, but we will also not be able to look ourselves in the eye. Bringing them back is not a sacrifice or a deathly difficult decision. It is the easiest decision. Not only because of morality or sentiment. In this harsh and terrible region, in front of the heavy gates of Gaza, and the equally heavy gates of Lebanon, in front of all those who seek our lives - what do we have, besides one another? What do we have, all of us, if not the ancient commitment: all for one? Truly. Not as a slogan. If we give up this resolute solidarity, for which brave fighters like Arnon Zamora are willing to sacrifice their lives, what will remain of Israeli identity? What will give us the security and feeling that we have a backbone? That we are all here together. Whoever thinks these are just slogans, thinks that Israel is just a slogan, and he is the one who has lost hope, and I, and you too, we have not lost hope in Israel's future. There will come a day when Nir Oz will be rebuilt by those of you who want to return there. How and when - that is your decision. In my view, and in the

view of the members of Nir Oz and their well-wishers, you are the sovereign owners of the most symbolically important settlement for the future of the project called "The State of Israel". You will decide, and then maybe we will sit again on the porch on an autumn evening. But first – we need to bring them home."

Farewell words from Yifat Assaf

That's it... I have completed six years in the role of the kibbutz secretary. The most amazing role there is. A role of great beauty. Complex, challenging, fascinating, empowering. For six years, I came joyfully to the office every morning. For six years, I made every effort to do good, and in those six years, I certainly made many mistakes as well. I was delighted again and again with the opportunity that the role allowed me to listen and to help. Sometimes I succeeded... when a person entered my office in distress and left with a sense of relief, calmer. To be there for the Yizrael public, to do something for our kibbutz. I paid the price and made the sacrifices willingly, because it was for the sake of our home. What a privilege it is to be in a position of influence, to lead, to create, to innovate, to think about how to improve this place that is so dear to me. To constantly move between the individual good and the collective good. To look at things systemically, and to make decisions that are right for this place and its future, and at the same time, to worry about the details. Yes, many times there is a conflict between the two. I tried to contain the contradiction and hold onto the complexity by breathing deeply.

Management Committee Meeting Protocol - July 3, 2024

Present: Jeremy Perling, Sigal Hadar, Ron Cohen, Tzachi Tzfadia, Natalie Zinenko, Yifat Assaf

1. Establishment of an Economic Team for the Community (Invitees: Erez and Maor)

Jeremy proposed the establishment of an economic team to advise on economic issues for the community management. Erez and Maor expressed the opinion that there is no need for an additional team and suggested utilising existing members for economic advice. It was decided, notwithstanding, to form an advisory team for economic matters consisting of Erez, Maor, and three members from the Economic Council. Maor and Erez will choose them.

2. Recommendation for the Implementation of the Profit Key 2025-2027 (Invited: Elad Ilan)

- Erez presented the community management's recommendations regarding the profit key.

It was decided to remove the section related to the transfer of pensions to the community from the "key" issue and discuss it separately.

The committee's recommendations will be brought to the asefa,

3. Establishment of a Community Strategy Team.

- Yifat presented the goal of establishing a strategic process for the community. It was decided that the steering team for the strategic process would include two members from the board and three members from the community management.

4. Discussion on the appeal process re the vote counting on the issue of "Special Cases" in the Food branch. (Guest: Shlomo Cohen)

- Jeremy presented the topic of the appeal process, and after discussion, it was decided to accept the community management's decision not to bring the issue to the asefa).

Note: The Management Committee reminds the public that it is the responsibility of each member to read the background material for asefot in advance, to understand, to ask questions, and to know what they are voting on. In addition, extra attention will be given in the asefa committee to clearly formulate the wording of the votes.

Asefa Report - July 8, 2024

Chairman of the Asefa: Shlomo Cohen. Asefa Secretary: Uri Gilad

Attendees: 37 members

1. Appointment of Natasha Tchernikovsky as the Manageress of the Reserve Fund

The appointment was presented by Elad Ilan. Elad defined the role of the fund manager, the requirements of the position, and Natasha's suitability for the role: "Natasha has extensive experience in accounting management, work with banks, and treasury work. She will learn together with me, and with the advisors of the Reserve Fund (Mannie Harel, Raviv Yishai) about pension aspects and investment issues. We believe Natasha has the skills to perform the role well. As the chairman, I will be actively involved in studying the material together with Natasha - Jeremy has been managing the fund since 2006 and has accumulated a lot of knowledge and experience. We will document the various processes in the fund and build work routines for its operation and control.

The board of directors of the Reserve Fund recommends to the asefa to approve the appointment of Natasha as the fund manager.

The vote took place during the asefa via the Kehilanet. Voting result: Natasha was voted in! Congratulations!

2. Allocation of land for the gas station complex

Ron Cohen presented the topic, following discussions and decisions made by the Economic Council on June 24, 2024. The vote took place during the asefa via Kehilanet.

Decision: The kibbutz asefa approves the transfer of 4 dunams of land, plots 520 + 521, to the Yizrael-Alon Joint Corporation for the purpose of expansion and business development. (71 in favour, 18 against, 5 abstentions).

3. Extended Vacation Policy

Ishai Levi presented the proposal of the community management on the subject, which was formulated after the previous asefa. The vacation policy came up for discussion in the asefa a number of times, and after many objections, including those requiring legal consultation, the discussion was stopped to obtain legal advice, to examine the objections raised and integrate some of them in the proposal as well as to add an appendix referring to retired members (in collaboration with Inbal Adler, the senior citizen coordinator). Ishai presented the proposed policy, including the appendix referring to vacations for members beyond working age

Eddie Solow presented an amendment: To cancel the vacation route up to 6 months, and in its place, there will be one uniform route from the end of the (48) accrued vacation days until two years. Voting results: 39 against, 27 in favour, 3 abstentions.

The amendment was not accepted.

Yitzchak Peleg explained that if a pensioner in out of the country for more than 10 months in any calendar year, the National Insurance will automatically cancel his monthly payments to the kibbutz, even though he will still be receiving his monthly allowance (According to the proposed procedure). Eddie Solow and Sigal Hadar presented an amendment: in each calendar year, in which a member above working age stays abroad and the National Insurance stops payments to the kibbutz - the member is required to complete these payments from their allowance.

Voting results: 40 in favour, 18 against, 3 abstentions. The amendment was accepted.

The proposed policy, as suggested by the community management, with the accepted amendment, will be brought to the vote on Sunday and Monday, July 14-15, 2024.

From the Standby Team

Hello everyone,

These times are not normal, and even if relative quiet is felt - the members of the kibbutz's standby team do not rest on their laurels.

Last Tuesday, 9/7/2024, the standby team met to discuss what we have achieved, and to discuss the plans for continued activity.

As is well known, the kibbutz's standby team changed significantly after the events of October 7th, and in the nine months since then, has been shaping up to be a fast response unit, to provide an experienced and effective defensive force for repelling terrorist infiltration in the first hours and providing a security response - until the various official security forces get here (P.G. – Ed).

The unit is the first layer of protection for the kibbutz - in an emergency.

In addition, the team provides an emergency response to a variety of events, including search and rescue, firefighting, and more.

Without going into too much detail, the standby squad operates in several reaction circles, and possesses automatic rifles and private pistols. Also, in recent months, the team has been equipped with ceramic protective vests, tactical helmets, walkie-talkies, high-quality first aid equipment and a variety of related equipment.

At the meeting last Tuesday, the training plan was discussed, regardless of or taking into account the training plan of the Border Police, (they tend to be very vague). We also discussed different scenarios.

I will take this opportunity to remind you that if, God forbid, you find yourselves in a security incident - do not take part in it, but report to the relevant authorities (police/Lilach), and immediately enter the protected area (Mamad – Ed).

The main concern is friendly fire through misidentification. The standby squad is trained and identified by various means known to it, (Say no more – Ed) and anyone who is not part of it may be mistakenly identified with dire consequences.

Finally, I would like to thank a very significant group of people, (who cannot be named) who give their time and voluntarily take part in protecting the community - this is highly appreciated and not taken for granted at all!

Updates on the Fight Against the International Airport

at Ramat David

To learn more about the details, you are invited to a conference that will take place on July 21 from 8:30 AM to 1:00 PM at the hall in Kibbutz Yifat.

The struggle that has been ongoing for many years is now at a boiling point. The Airport Establishment Authority, Netivei Israel, together with the Transportation Department of the Planning Administration and the Ministry of Finance, are pushing hard for a decision on establishing the airport at Ramat David. The environmental impact assessment has been submitted, and the Ministry of Environmental Protection, whose role was to review the assessment, also ruled that there were many flaws in the plan. Mainly, they stated that the establishment of such an airport would significantly harm the health, environment, food security, and safety of the region's residents. According to the report, thousands of residents are expected to be evacuated from their homes due to noise levels exceeding international standards. Their recommendation is for the "zero alternative"—meaning not to establish an international airport in the valley. And like a scene from "Blaumilch Canal," disconnected from this severe warning, notices were sent to seven communities in the valley about the need to close reservoirs and dams, and an invitation was sent to all regional authorities for a discussion in the Planning Administration titled "Implementation of Sections 78-77 of the Construction Law on the Impact Area of the Ramat David Airport." Attached is the map showing the effects of construction restrictions, agricultural restrictions, etc.—seeing is believing.



The above map marks the restrictions around the planned airport

Gray – The airport area itself

Orange: No high-rise buildings area

Yellow – No planting of crops likely to attract birds (Scorched earth policy? – Ed)

While in 2014, they spoke of a small airport on a 3,000-dunam area, today the figures, which the administration itself disclosed, show a huge airport, with 32 million passengers a year, affecting an area of over 600,000 dunams (X 200 bigger – Ed?). From Rechasim, through Tivon, Yokneam, Ramat Yishai, Zarzir, Migdal HaEmek, Jezreel

Valley, Afula, Megiddo, and Gilboa. (Yizrael is in the bottom right-hand corner of the above map – ED)

The practical implication is that any construction and development plan in the area of the airport, will need to be approved by the planning team, treating the airport in the valley as a fait accompli. The restrictions have dramatic implications for a range of projects in the rural area, but especially in the nearby cities where it will not be possible to promote urban renewal plans, build new neighbourhoods, and advance strategic projects in the field of renewable energy. Through joint efforts of the regional councils and the residents' headquarters, we managed to get the discussion postponed for now (**not canceled, postponed!**).

On July 1, 2024, members of the Airport Establishment Authority came to a meeting about the water reservoirs at the Jezreel Valley Regional Council. Dozens of residents from valley communities, Migdal HaEmek, Tivon, Zarzir, Megiddo, and Ramat Yishai came to protest. The council meeting was no less turbulent, with a line of experts led by Council Head Shlomit Reichman Shichor arguing before the planning team that they do not have the mandate to advance such a destructive plan without a strategic national discussion on the implications of the airport's establishment on food security, massive loss of agricultural lands, severe and disproportionate harm to the health of tens of thousands of residents, and the complete destruction of a rural area based on agriculture and rural tourism.

A conference on this subject will be held on July 21 from 8:30 AM to 1:00 PM at the hall in Kibbutz Yifat. How I Fell in Love with Football - Nir Baor

Football and I have never been friends.

I was never really a star on the field. As a child I was chosen among the last for the team that was the last to get the right to choose its players. I never really liked watching football either. A game that in a period of an hour and a half could end without a decision, bored me... as compared with the fast and intense basketball game. Nevertheless, in order to prove myself, I chose to support legendary teams such as Shimshon Tel Aviv, which was in first place for 7 games in the '89 season and a year later was relegated.

In short, despite many World Cups and exemplary players that came and went, I never really connected. I was kept up to date regarding the soccer news, mainly by my students.

I was also emotionally alienated from the long-standing conflict between Ronaldo and Messi, although as a socialist I always preferred the millionaire from Barcelona to his friend from Franco's fascist party.

Last year, I started to see football differently.

In December 2022, Shani and I went to Germany, so that Shani could undergo innovative cancer treatments there. It was a freezing winter trip to Frankfurt in the middle of the World Cup in Qatar. With the Memory of Yosef Gavrilov, that Lives Within Us.

May his memory be a blessing. During a conversation with Veronica at the Shiva for Yosef, may he rest in peace, I remembered my long-standing connection with Yosef. It began in late 1995, shortly after Stas established the Music School.

One evening, my gaze lingered on an unfamiliar figure of a man, sitting alone and surrounded by a special aura, at one of the western tables in the dining room. A few days later, I noticed him again, sitting at the same table. We are accustomed to new faces in the dining room and continue our way. But then, I was drawn to the same unfamiliar figure, the same personality with a delicate and noble aura; I was drawn to converse with him and approached his table. Indeed, he impressed me greatly.

Almost immediately, a lively dialogue began between us. Since our first meeting, I felt that he was a special person. From his words, I understood that he is Stas' father and that he brings his wife, Raisa, one of the first teachers at the music school, for her lessons here, and he waits for her to take her back to their new home in Afula. He has not yet told me anything about himself and his achievements, and his impressive life. Only a few days after our early conversations, I gradually learned that Yosef, the modest and humble man, left behind an impressive public and educational career in Tajikistan. For years, he was the head of a college, trained many students, and also served as a national supervisor for music education. And not only that. He was known in his homeland as a clarinet virtuoso.

Yosef lived for many, many years and accompanied from afar, his students in various countries, and greatly influenced the advancement and success of several prominent individuals.

The joint decision with Raisa to immigrate to Israel marked a turning point in their blessed lives. It was in 1992. Initially, they settled in Tel Aviv, where they had to start everything from scratch. Yosef then initiated another significant turning point in his life. With courage and a clear mind, he decided to detach himself from all aspects and branches of his own life endeavors and dedicate himself entirely to promoting Raisa's musical career, as a pianist and excellent music teacher. He himself became a construction worker by day and worked in a bakery at night...

From the rich traditional heritage of the Jews of Bukhara, from the rich and fertile background of their worlds in the capital of Tajikistan, Raisa and Yosef descended to an environment that surrounded them in the neighbourhoods of southern Tel Aviv, and of course to a new language and vibrant life. After a year in Tel Aviv, Yosef and Raisa moved to Afula, closer to Stas and Anna, who were building their future here, with us, in the Jezreel Valley. And then Yosef started again from scratch and became a simple labourer, a craftsman, in "Tamuz". Indeed, the greatness of soul, strength of spirit, and nobility of character distinguished our Yosef at every stage and every chapter of his inspiring biography and that of our dear Raisa, paving the way for long and fruitful lives!"

We know and greatly appreciate Raisa, who has taught here, at the music school, generations of students. So many remember you, Raisa, for the kindness over the years as you raised them, nurtured them, and helped them flourish through a very personal connection to each and every one of them.

A covenant of fate and destiny has accompanied this "unity" of Yosef and Raisa all these years. Stella, Stas' sister, said after Yosef's passing: "You and Mom were always a complete unit for us. You were always a role model for us."

Yosef, your memory and legacy will live on within us and among your communities of students and colleagues in many lands. Blessed are we that we have been honoured to know you. Amen, may it be so!
