Reut's Editorial: Two weeks ago, on Saturday, we celebrated my aunt's

eightieth birthday. It was a warm, cosy gathering at my cousin's home and, unlike events held in restaurants or halls, the setting gave us the chance to really talk. At one point, our discussion drifted to childhood memories, and somehow, we realised that almost everyone of us had, at some time, gone through that awful moment when a child wandered off and got lost. For a few minutes, we



shared those stories, remembering the fear, the helplessness, and then the relief when the child was found. And then we moved on to other subjects.

A week later, on Friday, I joined the trip from Yizrael to support Kibbutz Nir Oz. In Kiryat Gat See Yifat Assaf's article on page X) We stood together with the demonstrators, circling the roundabout and raising our voices for the release of the hostages. Afterward, we sat down to hear from Renana Gome-Yaakov, whose two children, Or and Yagil, were held captive for 52 days. Her words struck me deeply. "You can't imagine what it's like to know your child has been kidnapped," she told us. "But try. Haven't you all lost a child, even briefly, in a supermarket, on the beach, or in the park? Do you remember that instant of terror, the awful realisation that your child is gone and you don't know where they are? And then, the relief when you find them? That's the feeling. Only for us, for the families of the hostages, that moment has lasted already 679 days and there is no relief."

Later, when we entered the dining hall—its door still scarred by bullet holes—I saw



something that made my heart ache. In every kibbutz, the entrance to the dining hall has noticeboards and rows of mailboxes. On Nir Oz, the notices from October 2023 are still hanging there, frozen in time. A red sticker marks those who will never come back to their mailbox. A black sticker marks those who were kidnapped. I couldn't stop thinking: may those still alive return

home soon, into the arms of their loved ones. And may those who were murdered at least be laid to rest, here, in Israel, where they belong.




Last week marked a month since the passing of our beloved Hassida.

Economic Council Summary – 21.07.2025

Agenda:

Review of budget performance for January–May 2025 and forecast for year-end.

Presentation:

Niv Harmoni, Economist from the Finance Department, presented the budget performance and forecast.

Main points:

- The 2025 budget was planned as a balanced budget.
- At its base, the budget included an increase of NIS 2.7M in support for the ongoing community budget (NIS 8M instead of NIS 5.3M).
- The 2025 forecast shows a small deficit of approx. NIS 140,000.
- Expenses are about NIS 240,000 higher than budgeted, while revenues are higher by approx. NIS 100,000.
- The increase in revenues stems mainly from external employment income and state allowances.
- The increase in expenses results mainly from:
 - An error in calculating the personal budget line.
 - Higher tax payments (primarily to National Insurance) due to legislative changes in the 2025 state budget, which were passed after the community budget was prepared and approved.

Community Funds performance:

After the operating budget was reviewed, the status of the funds was presented. The main investments are in housing. The housing fund forecast for year-end is approx. NIS 1M higher than planned, due to faster-than-expected progress in the new neighbourhood construction project.

In the Field

Start of Stage B Infrastructure Works + Car Park Expansion

This week, final infrastructure works began around the first 10 housing units in the northern neighbourhood, which are nearing completion.

The works include laying stone embankments, building pavements, installing pathway lighting, filling soil, and preparing the area for final landscaping.

These works are expected to continue until mid-October.

After completion around the houses in the northern neighbourhood, the contractor will proceed with the expansion of the car park located above the Zelas and Alterlevi houses.

Completion of Electricity Room Construction – "Electric Room E"



Construction of the electricity room that will supply power to the entire northern neighbourhood (including future housing), the rugby field, and the 1004 complex, has been completed.

In the coming days, the Electricity Company is expected to carry out an inspection to approve the room, thereby enabling permanent electricity supply to the northern area of the kibbutz.

This electricity room joins the four existing ones across the kibbutz and will be named "Electric Room "ה"

Start of Foundation Drilling for 12 Additional Housing Units

This week, drilling and casting of foundations began for 12 more housing units, which form Stage B of the northern neighbourhood.

The Metamorphoses of the Boykies Hut





The "Boykies" pub (the hut next to the old rugby field) has changed its identity, and this is a wonderful opportunity to tell the story of a wooden hut that changed the face of rugby on the kibbutz.

Our rugby team was established in 1969, with the arrival of many immigrants from English-speaking countries, who brought with them the sport they loved. They began to play

rugby on a shabby playing field with little infrastructure. Thus, rugby on the kibbutz began with little more than sheer passion for the game and great determination.

In the early 1980s, with the construction of the new dining hall (which, believe it or not, is still called "new" after 40 years even though it is falling apart...). Louis Milner (of blessed memory) suggested moving one of the huts near the dining hall to the rugby field. A meeting was convened, and the idea was approved. The hut was loaded onto a tractor and trailer and hauled to the place where it still stands today!

Milton Kaplan recalls:

"At first, the hut served as a locker room, and finally we could change cloths with dignity and no longer in the open, between the almond trees... In addition, after so many years, we had a place, with a roof, to sit and talk before games, to shelter at halftime from the driving rain or blistering sun. The rugby club became a second home for the players. There's no doubt that the club gave us encouragement and motivation both on and off the field! The hut gave us the opportunity to make the leap from being "Yizrael's rugby team" to becoming the "Yizrael Rugby Club". From there, we grew both as a club and as a family, gaining a sense of belonging and identity."

In the early 2000s, when new locker rooms were built, the clubhouse was abandoned and became a "storage room" full of memorabilia from many years. The hut deteriorated, and so we decided we must restore it and give it the honour it deserved as part of the rugby club's history.

Over several years, we replaced the roof and walls, tiled the floor, painted, and renovated—until in 2006, the renewed "Boykies" pub was inaugurated. The name *Boykies* comes from the chants of the South Africans in the crowd calling to the players— "Kadima Boykies!" "GO BOYKIES!". (Go Little Boys – Ed)

The new Boykies was something we had never had before—a true Club House, just like in top clubs worldwide.

A place that was also a museum, filled with a long history and unforgettable memories, with a trophy cabinet proudly displaying the victories of the club's teams, a small pub with a T.V. for watching games or just relaxing after matches—in short, a home where we spent long and wonderful hours together.

In 2021, the rugby field moved to its new venue, and the hut became a storeroom. The dust collected on the old shields and trophies.

When we were approached about handing the place over for the new "Nogaria" project, we were glad that someone would take the building and give it new lease of life — but we did so with mixed emotions. How could we give up a piece of our history? What would become of the memories and the trophies? We knew we wouldn't use the place again, but it was hard to let go...

Eventually, we cleared out all the memorabilia and trophies, took down the photos, jerseys, ties, crests, and flags from the walls, and packed everything carefully into boxes for storage. We promise that the Boykies, like the phoenix, will rise again one day! The plaques and shields will hang on new walls. The Cups and trophies will be displayed in all their glory


Summary of the Young Generation Committee Meeting 11.08.25

Agenda and Topics Discussed:

- 1. **Ongoing Updates Committee Activity Status:** Current updates were presented regarding the committee's activities and initiatives for the summer and the beginning of the new year.
- 2. Rosh HaShanah Toast 5786: Scheduled to take place on Saturday, 20.09.25.
- 3. **Summer Party with Rugby Club:** Scheduled for Friday, 29.08.25. The party will be held immediately after the traditional *Touch Night* event, a joint initiative of the Young Generation and the Rugby Club, aimed at strengthening connections and providing an enjoyable community activity.
- 4. On the Tour in Nir Oz and More...

We set out on Friday morning on a bus from the kibbutz, for a solidarity visit with the members of Nir Oz – the kibbutz that became the symbol of abandonment on the 7th of October. A kibbutz where one in four was kidnapped or murdered that Saturday. A kibbutz left to face the horrors alone. The army only arrived after the last terrorist had finished his evil work and left.



We began with a solidarity rally at Karmei Gat Junction, holding yellow flags and signs, beneath the tall buildings where the residents of Nir Oz have been living since that day. There we met Renana Goma, mother of Or and Yagel Yaakov, who were kidnapped and released in the first deal. We heard the story of her family and the community, and were exposed to the frustration, pain, difficulty and learned of the huge struggle she waged for the release of her children and the

other children – all through channels outside the state. From there we left to tour the kibbutz itself, led by Natan, one of the only three members currently living in the kibbutz.



The tour was unbearable. The kibbutz — devastated. Desolate. Empty of people. Burnt and charred. Only six houses in Nir Oz were left untouched that day. We walked among the homes, signs with the families' names outside each house, and pictures of the hostages and the murdered. So many faces and names we already know well. The Bibas family's house — a punch to the gut. The toys, the infamous pavement from that nightmare video. More and more sights of collapse,

destruction, and ruin – left as they were, a living–dead testimony to the horror. Everything silent and dry, except for the bougainvillea blooming in all its splendour, as though it had not been updated on what happened there.

On the mailboxes in the dining hall there are red and black stickers. A black sticker marked "hostage". A red sticker marked "murdered". So many mailboxes have a sticker. Perhaps the most chilling and illustrative picture we saw there.



It was so hot, and so unbearably sad. It is impossible to believe such a thing really happened. Impossible to grasp even a fraction of it.

Two days later – the day of the general strike and the great protest led by the hostages' families. The huge demonstration in Tel Aviv. Again, a bus from the kibbutz, hostage shirts, flags and signs. We gathered with tens of thousands more at Savidor Railway Station, and began marching with the crowds towards Hostages Square. I told the person walking beside me that this is what the phrase of the song means: "Suddenly a man wakes in the morning and feels he is a nation and starts walking." Head held high; feet almost floating. A powerful and moving feeling, one I had not felt since the peace rally of 1995, the one at the end of which Rabin was assassinated. Uplift. Hope. There are still masses who think like us. Who want a sane country. Who sanctify life, not war or the seat of power.

The immense march was led by a pickup truck playing the song *HaBayta* ("Home"). Tears. How can it be that they are still there? What must the mothers whose children are still there, be going through?

It is hard to describe the number of people and the atmosphere there. I noticed a giant rubber ball being tossed above the crowd, hand to hand, with the words written on it: "For still my soul longs for freedom." Wow. What strength. That song is like an anthem in our family.

And true, perhaps for Bibi, his wife and his troop of advisers, it will change nothing. So why go out to march in the hot humid air. Why relinquish the glorious air conditioning? Why bother?

- 2 To embrace the families and show them they are not alone!
- Recause perhaps one hostage sees the pictures, realises that people are fighting for him, and draws strength to survive another day.
- Representation 2.2 To know that we did not stand idly by in the face of the horrors.
- So that in the future we can tell our children and grandchildren that we acted when our state fell silent and was nowhere to be seen.
- And because even a vast sea is made up of drops.

Renana Gome asked that each of us do something for the hostages every single day. Even something small. To wear a hostage pin, share a post, put a flag on the car, stand



at a junction, join demonstrations.


Something. And for each of us to try to imagine – if only for five minutes – that it was our own child there, in Hamas's darkness.

A day will come when our children or grandchildren will ask what we did during this dreadful time, when hostages were starving in captivity for nearly two years, while for our government, other things were more important than bringing them home.

Let us act, so that we will have answers for our grandchildren.

We embrace the dear community of Nir Oz, and send them strength for healing and love – to them and to our whole grieving country.

May we soon see them all, all of them, home 🙏 🙏 Yifat Assaf



Diving into the Archives – Music on Yizrael

When passing by the House of Music, one can delight in the sounds emanating from it. Perhaps my memory deceives me, but when I arrived in Yizrael in 1971, there weren't many musicians here. I remember Ofra Shapira on the guitar, and there were always a few of the volunteers who played, but I don't recall anyone else playing in those days, and only a handful in the years that followed.

All this changed in 1992, when Stas and Anna Gavrilov came to the Ulpan, and within a few weeks they were already playing at Kabbalat Shabbat, at cultural evenings, and at

every opportunity that came their way—greatly upgrading the level of music among us.

Stas and Anna founded the House of Music, and today, besides the performances held there, the musical activity is felt in kibbutz events, and one can sense that we are blessed with quite a number of young musicians.

I searched the archive for a photograph of music-making from the early days of the kibbutz. It is likely that there were musicians in Yizrael from the beginning, but the earliest photo I found was from the late 1950s.
